## GOVERNMENT

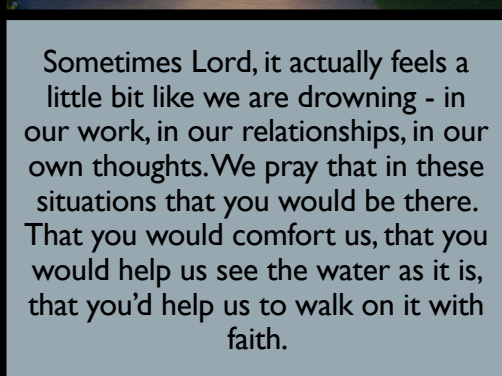

## Bible in Schools: Brainwashing our Children?

Bible in Schools (now usually called 'Christian Religious Education') has been a feature of New Zealand society for generations. But lately questions have been raised about whether it is appropriate for children to be exposed to this sort of thing. Some have said that it is simply not a good use of time in the classroom. Others have even called it 'brainwashing'.

My thoughts on this issue come from growing up in an un-churched home, but being taught Bible in Schools at Woodend Primary School. I remember having teachers of various quality, being interested in what was said, and thinking that these people put up with a lot of nonsense from us!

Many years later, when I came to a more thorough exploration of the Christian faith at the age of 19, some of the things I'd heard in Bible in Schools were still with me. My wife,

who also came from an un-churched home in North Canterbury, tells a similar story.

Were we brainwashed? If so, our Bible in Schools teachers did a poor job! Most of my classmates who I am still in touch with have not taken up Christianity - in most cases, I suspect, they haven't even looked into Christianity in any depth.

However what all the children in my class did get from Bible in Schools was exposure to the Bible - one of the most formative documents in our society, history, culture and language. We were given information and experiences which, as we got older, we were able to sift and assess and interlink with new learnings, so that we could come to conclusions of our own. Just like children do in many important areas of life.

So from where I stand, claims that Bible in Schools is a form of

brainwashing seem rather ludicrous. Bible in Schools is more like a form of 'consciousness raising', where (within an approved curriculum) children can be exposed to a worldview that has helped form our culture, and they can then assess that worldview from an informed position as they grow older.

That's why Bible in Schools has always seemed to me both a good use of class time, and a world away from brainwashing. Please pray for Helen Wakefield and her Bible in Schools team at Fendalton School.

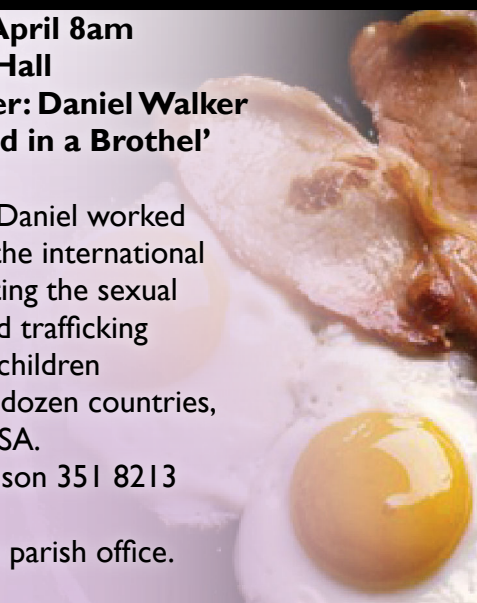

# TRUST THROUGH TEARS

Grief. It's a strange word.

Grief goes beyond and below sadness. It's different from depression. It has a known cause – an event, a loss, an impossible burden from which there is no escape. At the time, grief seems like an interminably dark, no-exit street. Yet experiencing grief is part of the human condition.

Jesus knew all about it. He is described as a "man of sorrows, acquainted with grief" (Isaiah chapter 53 verse 3)

Sometimes we can sail along for years without being stricken by any of it. However, grief and loss go hand in hand. The older we get, the more losses we inevitably experience. One day we have our youth, fitness and health. Gradually we realise we're losing one, or all three attributes. What's more shocking and difficult is unexpected death or absence. Even our recent loss of much of Christchurch's built environment triggers grief. This served to bind us to our personal histories.

Some don't want to acknowledge sad facts. I had a neighbour who'd reached his forties, proud of never having attended a funeral. He couldn't "deal with death." It's more likely that he didn't want to circumnavigate big questions of meaning. They're not what our culture wants to face.

Last Saturday a Christchurch friend of mine hosted a fund-raising morning tea. Her extended family has set up a Trust to raise funds for accommodation near the Royal Marsden Hospital Sutton, for the families of UK children receiving cancer treatment and care. Why? She was motivated by the need to do something positive, because she'd lost her darling nephew, Ben, to a brain tumour. This time last year Ben was still with us on earth.

Aged six, Ben McNicol already had a strong Christian faith. He was a bright, lively little boy, who helped his many friends with their school work, and was keen on his sport too. Despite successful surgery and a good prognosis, Ben's tumour returned and he died on 26 May 2012. The wonderful thing is, however, that shortly before he died, Ben spoke of meeting his friend Jesus.

Ben had an unshakeable belief and a quiet realisation that Jesus would look after him and be with him in Heaven, just as he'd been with him here. Ben serves as an inspiration to us all.

# Fendalton Parish Annual General Meeting

The 2013 Parish AGM was held on Wednesday 27 March. The following notes are just an excerpt of the meeting's discussions.

**Vicar's Report:** Mark highlighted 10 significant factors that have given 'new life' to the parish during the past year:

- Response to the Stewardship Campaign
- Warm reception visitors received
- Progress on the Maintenance of our buildings.

**St Barnabas Trust:** Trust Chairman, Richard Ballantyne, spoke passionately about the Trust. To date just over \$249,000 of the \$1 million needed had been had been given or pledged. He reminded us that the insurance will not cover the work needed, and that we will need the extra \$1 million dollars when the repairs get the go ahead.

**Maintenance Fund Raising:** The parish will concentrate this year on three primary projects: a Fair, Variety Concert, and Garden Tour. Other

initiatives are still welcome.

**Outreach Giving:** The Vestry wished to acknowledge the many needs outside our parish. As a result a motion was agreed upon which encourages the Vicar, Wardens and Vestry to seek ways to support and assist specific projects outside the parish each year, and to aspire to give up to 10% of parish income to these outside projects.

**Acknowledgements:** Appreciation was expressed in different ways for the Vicar's leadership, the staff and myriad volunteers who work quietly and effectively, for retiring Vestry members and the Vaimairi/Fendalton Council for their ongoing help and support.

## Why do you follow Jesus?

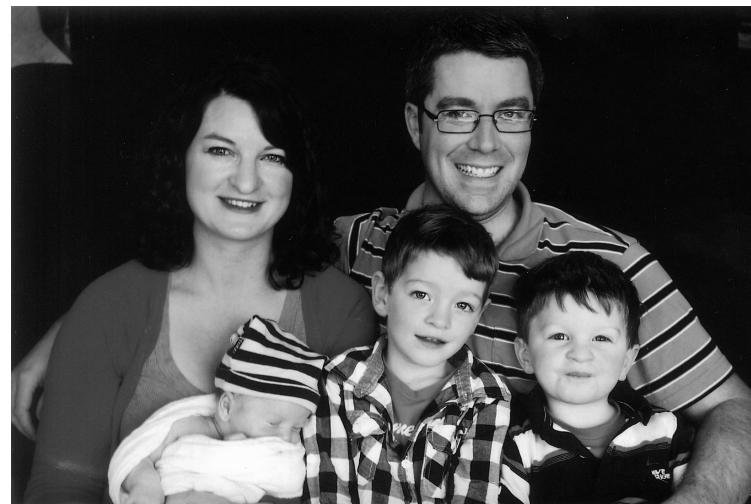
Because He loves us and gave His life for us.

# THE TRANSITIONAL, 'CARDBOARD' CATHEDRAL

Often in the Church's history, it has engaged enthusiastically in prophetic activity. That is, through word or action, walked in Christ's footsteps 'beyond the gates' giving a clear lead. Such living involves risk. Stepping out of our comfort zone to walk on unknown and uncharted roads is uncomfortable but always exciting.

The Transitional 'Cardboard' Cathedral project presented to the Cathedral Chapter and the Diocese is a unique opportunity to re-engage with the prophetic. Though there have been many dissenting voices heard, the decision to proceed with this project will in hindsight be seen as a watershed moment in the life of the Church. While most, if not all, other rebuild projects to date play it safe, the Transitional 'Cardboard' Cathedral pushes the boundaries. In this project, we are presenting an economic, creative and beautiful lead to the city as it seeks a way ahead.

A sign that we are on the right path with this unique Cathedral is seen through the massive national and international following we have experienced. While Christchurch grumbles, others see this building as fascinating and groundbreaking.

The latest media enquiry came from the 'Engineering Insight Magazine'. In response, our Fire Engineer (from Holmes Fire) conveyed something of his thoughts on the project. His words I think sum up the general feeling of the project team:

*"We chased this project because it looked so iconic and unique... For the fire engineers, seeing the completed cathedral, signed off, safe and yet still a beautiful clean-lined space, will be a real moment of satisfaction. We just wanted to be part of this," says Mr Millar. "Guys from across the office got involved because they could see it was one to be proud of."*

## St Barnabas' Fendalton Trust

The St Barnabas Fendalton Trust has been set up to raise funds for the maintenance and repair of parish buildings. Our church is one of the few remaining stone churches in Christchurch, is situated on a main city route, and was built as a war memorial. This church deserves to be repaired so that the legacy of those visionary parishioners of past years is maintained and our much loved church continues to be our community's focal point.

Despite good insurance cover, there is a shortfall as a result of the policy excess, costs involved in strengthening the building up to the code and other compliance costs. We are

seeking to raise \$1 million. The Trust's Chair is Richard Ballantyne who is enthusiastically offering his time and energy to help us meet our target. We have raised more than \$249,000 but still have a long way to go.
